

NATIVE PRAIRIE PLANTS FOR MIDWESTERN RAIN GARDENS ON LOAMY AND CLAY SOILS

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Rain gardens are subject to fluctuating soil moisture conditions, from flooded and submerged after a big storm, to bone dry during extended summer drought. Loamy and clay soils tend to retain moisture in the subsoil, making them an excellent medium for supporting plants that grow in wet prairies, wet mesic prairies, and sedge meadows.

The plants below have been selected for use in rain gardens in the Midwestern United States in medium or “mesic” soils. These include loam, silt loam, and clay loam soils. Rain gardens are recommended for planting in sunny sites that receive at least one half day of full sun. The plants below have been selected based upon the following criteria:

- 1) Grow in wet soil conditions when temporarily flooded for a day or two after a hard rain, and in dry soil conditions during periods of summer drought
- 2) Tolerant of heavy clay soil
- 3) Non-aggressive by seed or underground creeping rhizomes
- 4) Grow in full sun to at least one half day sun (not for shaded rain garden situations)
- 5) Attractive flowers, foliage, and textures
- 6) Ability to attract and support birds, butterflies, and other desirable wildlife

* Vanilla Sweetgrass and Palm Sedge creep by rhizomes and can be somewhat aggressive. Both are low-growing and shallow-rooted, and usually do not interfere with the growth of other flowers, grasses, and sedges in the rain garden.

The flowers and grasses listed above have many positive attributes and often make good members of prairie meadows. However, they can be overly aggressive in garden situations, and should be avoided.
